
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Wendy Erb '12

In a recent CNN article, John Shea made a very needed point about the claim that 50,000 to 60,000 year-old stone tools unearthed in southwestern China were made by Neanderthals: "Stone tools are not ID cards." Dominic Stratford

Dominic Stratford co-authored a Science paper, which (finally) was able to test carbon and nitrogen isotopes from tooth enamel of species older than 200,000 years, showing that these hominins did not consume significant amounts of meat.

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
