Slow Looking: Art and Observation in the Toolkit of Clinical Diagnosis

The rapid pace of medicine has created challenges for physicians and physicians-in-training to find the time and space to have impactful communications with patients, from history-taking and clinical diagnosis to discussions of treatment and care.

Slow Looking, the mindful observation of representational and non-representational Art, is a skill that can be transferred to the patient encounter.

A similar technique of mindful *Slow Listening* is synergistic with *Slow Looking*. These skills may promote a more thorough understanding of the patient narrative, delay premature diagnostic closure, and help to create the empathy and compassion that is essential in the patient-physician journey.



Vincent de Luise M.D. is an assistant clinical professor of ophthalmology at Yale University School of Medicine and a Distinguished Visiting Scholar in Bioethics and Medical Humanities at Stony Brook University Renaissance School of Medicine.

Dr de Luise is a graduate of Princeton University, the Weill Cornell Medical College and the Bascom Palmer Eye Institute. He gives an annual course on art, visual perception and the eye at the American Academy of Ophthalmology.
